

2 POT À L'EAU-DE-VIE

Accompanied by a guide, discover the thousands of seabirds on this archipelago. Explore the island for several hours or spend the night in the charming Pot à l'Eau-de-Vie (Brandy Pot) Lighthouse, which is a federal heritage building. Intriguing maritime history, fresh sea air and a complete change of scenery are on the agenda.

Take a Duvetnor boat across to the islands (20 minutes) while enjoying one of their two packages: a boat tour of the archipelago or a boat tour with a lighthouse visit. You can also spend the night in the lighthouse (which includes the boat trip, fine regional cuisine, accommodations and a guided tour).



③ ÎLE VERTE

∠ Learn about the history of this lighthouse, the first built on the St. Lawrence, in 1809. Climb the 17-metre (56-foot) tower to admire Île Verte (Green Island) and the surrounding scenery, including the Tadoussac sand dunes, Île Rouge (Red Island) and the Haut-Fond Prince Lighthouse. Whales, including the white belugas, are often a spectacular part of the scenery.

Spend the night on Île Verte and enjoy its authentic rural charm, which will take you back in time. Located on the north side of the island, the lightkeeper's and assistant lightkeeper's houses offer a quiet and comfortable stay in cosy rooms with a maritime atmosphere. Breakfast is included, and you can prepare your own meals in the kitchen.

5 POINTE-AU-PÈRE

Climb the 128 steps to the top of this over one-hundred-year-old lighthouse, a national historic site of Canada. A guide will tell you about the light mechanism, the St. Lawrence pilots, the four lighthouses built on this site and the lives of the lightkeepers. The exhibits in the outbuildings are also worth a visit. Across the street, the Empress of Ireland Pavilion presents the history of the passenger ship of the same name, including its sinking in 1914, which killed 1012 people. You can also take an audio-guided tour of the Onondaga submarine to learn about the daily lives of the submariners.

Y Enjoy a light snack or drink in the café on the second floor of the Onondaga submarine visitor centre.



26 BON-DÉSIR

✔ At the Cap-de-Bon-Désir Interpretation and Observation Centre, discover the history of the lighthouse and its lightkeepers. The exhibit also includes information about the challenges to navigation on the St. Lawrence, marine mammals and the Aboriginal presence in this area. Accompanied by a guide, observe the whales and seals in the Saguenay-St. Lawrence Marine Park. In the summer, interpretive activities are offered daily. A picnic area can be found at the foot of the lighthouse.

✓ The lighthouse site has been completely restored and a new multimedia exhibit will take you back in time. On the seven floors of the lighthouse tower, an exhibit chronicles the history of this lighthouse, the second oldest in Québec, built in 1830. This natural point is also an ideal location to observe marine mammals.

→ A magnificent panoramic site, Île aux Perroquets (Parrot Island) is an •• enchanting place to observe seabirds and marine mammals. Located in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the island is home to a heritage light station that has kept watch over the north shore of Anticosti Island since 1888. An interpretive trail will take you to the foghorn shed, where a permanent exhibit will tell you all about the fascinating history of this station.

For a unique island experience, spend the night in the light station where you can also enjoy meals featuring local flavours. The light station was revitalized and continues to be run in accordance with the principles of sustainable development.



2 POINTE-DES-MONTS

Extend your stay by spending the night in one of the four rooms in the lightkeeper's house. Breakfast is included.

1 ÎLE AUX PERROQUETS

32 PETITE ÎLE AU MARTEAU

Enjoy the trail on this island, which is perfect for hiking, picnics and relaxation. Observe the cliffs, seabirds and many different plants, including arctic and alpine species. At the end of the trail, learn about the history of this light station from 1915 to 1987.

36 POINTE OUEST

Accompanied by a resident naturalist, visit the western and central parts of Anticosti Island. Day-long tours and meals are available upon request.

Immerse yourself in the human history of Anticosti by spending a few days relaxing in one of the lightkeepers' houses, which have been turned into youth hostels. Enjoy a retreat from life's hectic pace just outside Port-Menier, with only a few white-tailed deer as your neighbours.

37 POINTE-NORD (CAP-DE-RABAST)

The outfitter Pourvoirie Lac Geneviève d'Anticosti offers stays at the northern point of Anticosti Island, which is also known as Cap-de-Rabast. (A rabast is an area where boats take shelter during bad weather.) For a unique vacation experience, rent the lightkeeper's house and explore the island by car or bike.

LIGHTHOUSE TRAI

The St. Lawrence River is dotted with over 40 lighthouses, all of which are located in exceptionally beautiful sites.

Proud witnesses to local maritime history, nearly 20 of these lighthouses have been given new life thanks to the work of dedicated individuals who have transformed these sentinels of the sea or their outbuildings into interpretation sites, inns or cottages.

This string of lighthouses makes up the Lighthouse Trail in the maritime regions of Québec. Whether you are looking for spectacular sea views or are a history or architecture buff, you will not want to miss the opportunity to visit these buildings and even spend the night or have a meal on site—a thrilling experience! Consider this an invitation...

8 CAP-CHAT

Perched on a cliff next to a cape in the shape of a cat, this lighthouse, which is still operational, is the departure point for several trails that lead to the sea. Discover the history of the Cap-Chat Lighthouse and its lightkeepers by reading the information panels. Wellness services are also offered on site. In addition, you can enjoy the labyrinth and a family-friendly scavenger hunt that focuses on the history and legends of this area.

Stay in the lightkeeper's house, which offers four rooms accommodating up to 15 people, two bathrooms, a fully equipped kitchen, a washer/dryer, a barbecue and a patio with a view of the St. Lawrence. Three cottages are also available for rent (for 5, 6 and 8 people).

9 LA MARTRE

✓ Visit a lighthouse with a unique wooden structure that has been in •• operation since 1906. The original timing system still controls the light. From the tower balcony, enjoy the strong winds and romantic setting. A permanent exhibit in the foghorn shed recounts the history of the various shipwrecks in this area and will introduce you to the expertise involved in designing lighthouse lanterns.



From the top of the lighthouse, take in the superb view and observe marine traffic, the wind farm and the Chic-Choc Mountains. You can also see the equipment found in a modern wheelhouse: radar, radio transmitter, weather station, etc. Visit the sea museum where you can relive some of the town's maritime history via photos and artefacts. The local tourism office is housed in the lightkeeper's house.

O CAP MADELEINE

Y The Cap Madeleine Lighthouse has been warning ships of dangers along the coast since 1871. Come and meet an interpreter guide who will be happy to tell you about life in Madeleine as well as the history of the lighthouse, foghorns, the paper mill, the railway and more. While you are there, be sure to observe the northern gannets and whales!

Y Stop in the café in the assistant lightkeeper's house for bagels with smoked salmon, sandwiches on homemade bread and delicious homemade cookies.

DOINTE-À-LA-RENOMMÉE

✔ Accompanied by a guide, visit the Pointe-à-la-Renommée Lighthouse, which was returned home in 1997 after spending two decades in Québec City. This lighthouse sits on the site of the first maritime radio station in North America, which was declared a national historic event of Canada. During your tour of the lighthouse and the wireless telegraphy building, you will learn about early methods of communication and the lives of the lightkeepers and their families.

12 CAP-DES-ROSIERS

ighthouse, which has been standing on this site since 1858. During your ascent, learn about the history and workings of this 34-metre (112-foot) tower. Visit the engine room and see the diaphone. After the tour, you can watch a movie about the role of the lightkeepers. A virtual visit of this lighthouse is also possible

13 CAP-GASPÉ

Perched on a 95-metre (310-foot) cliff, the Cap-Gaspé Lighthouse offers a unique view of the rich waters of the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Original buildings and information panels relate the history of this sentinel at the edge of the world, and a lookout at the foot of the cliff gives you the opportunity to observe seabirds and marine mammals






(D) CAP-D'ESPOIR

Rent the assistant lightkeeper's house, where you will find all the amenities you need for your comfort. Take the time to observe the sea, whales and seabirds. This site is a few kilometres west of the village of Percé.

1 DUTHIE'S POINT

Visit the Duthie's Point Lighthouse in the Gaspesian British Heritage Village and admire a superb view of Chaleur Bay, a member of the Most Beautiful Bays in the World Club. Eighteen historic buildings dating from 1775 to 1910 have been preserved and relocated to the site of a former naval shipyard. Discover gardens, artefacts, exhibits, hiking trails, a pebble beach and lodging on site.



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








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
